35 QUESTION TIME:

QUESTIONS FROM MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL NO 1.
Under Procedure Rule No 11, Councillor C Cooke will ask the Portfolio Holder for Quality of Life, the following question:-

"This is a request for a breakdown of the latest figures for empty residential dwellings within Tamworth Borough.
The breakdown requested is

- a. Dwellings empty for less than 6 months
- b. Dwellings empty for 6 months to two years
- c. Dwellings empty over two years?"

The Portfolio Holder for Quality of Life gave the following reply:

There are currently 392 dwellings that have been empty for less than 6 months, 217 have been empty for 6 months to two years and 60 have been empty for over two years. There are 12 Council properties currently on notice, 15 advertised and pre-allocated and 3 all viewed and signed up. We have set a target to bring 10 empty houses back into use per year.

Supplementary Question

"Do you believe that it is sufficient for only 10 houses a year to be brought back into use?"

Councillor M Oates gave the following reply:-

"The target of 10 has been exceeded, already 11 this year. Some we know the reasons why they are empty, some are subject to probate and some where residents are in hospital. Even if we brought all empty houses back into use we still wouldn't have enough housing."

QUESTIONS FROM MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL NO 2.
Under Procedure Rule No 11, Councillor C Cooke will ask the Portfolio Holder for Economic Development and Enterprise, the following question:-

"In 2005 a report produced by outside consultants recommended new standards for Open Space in the Tamworth. This has apparently been put on a back-burner. It was never consulted on therefore could never be adopted as policy. Bearing in mind this was 6 years ago now, will the portfolio holder advise me if and when I can expect these proposed new standards are to be consulted upon with a view to adopting the new standards as Council policy?"

The Portfolio Holder for Economic Development and Enterprise gave the following reply:

The Council has two adopted open space policies in its saved Local Plan (originally adopted in 2006, selected policies saved in 2009): ENV13: Protection of Open Space and ENV14: Open space for new developments. The latter policy sets a standard for the provision of new open space in new developments. This is a national standard and has been used since the Plan's adoption.

The Council commissioned consultants to undertake a study to identify the local demand for open space, advise on standards based on assessments of local

needs and identify specific needs, surpluses or deficiencies both now and in the future to inform the development of future planning policies.

This Open Space Study has informed the development of policies in the draft Core Strategy, the production of which has been delayed over a number of years due to delays in the production and adoption of the Regional Spatial Strategy Phase 2 Revision. The current Government has confirmed that Regional Spatial Strategies will be abolished which will allow local authorities to move forward with the production of new local plans.

The open space study is a piece of evidence to support the development of planning policies and has been available for those wishing to do so to comment on since it was published. The study has been used to inform policies in the core strategy, the most recent draft was consulted on in October 2009. The Open Space Study is currently being updated and the revised findings will inform the policies in the Core Strategy on standards taking into account changes in national guidance.

The Council intends to publish its Core Strategy for consultation in early 2012 and adopt it following an Examination in Public later in the year. This will contain its policy on the expected standard for the provision of new open space in new developments. Further detail may be provided by a supplementary planning document.

QUESTIONS FROM MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL NO 3.
Under Procedure Rule No 11, Councillor Andrew James will ask the Portfolio Holder for Economic Development & Enterprise, the following question:-

" Does the Portfolio Holder for Economic Development & Enterprise agree that the news that Tamworth Castle has won an award for educational work, is fantastic for both the Castle and the town and would he like to comment further?"

The Portfolio Holder for Economic Development & Enterprise gave the following reply:

- This is the second time the Castle has been presented with the Sandford award for excellence in heritage education. The inspector in his report described the workshop he visited as one of the best he has ever seen. He was also impressed by the hands on and interactive approach to the session giving it a wow factor for students.
- The education and events team at the Castle is led by Kirsty Sherwood supported by Rachel Wanklyn with 15 volunteers who help to deliver the sessions, in my view they should feel very proud of their achievement. As should all the castle staff given recent success in the HLF bid and on going Hoard Exhibition.
- The education team provide exciting lessons and workshops on Saxon, Medieval, Tudor, Stuart and Victorian history and across all key stages.

This comprehensive range of sessions in a fantastic setting delivered by an enthusiastic and skilled team is a real asset to the town.

Tamworth Listens Report

October 2011

Introduction

Tamworth Listens is a regular consultation process that feeds into the State of Tamworth Debate.

The idea behind Tamworth Listens is to involve the public in a debate about Tamworth borough and to make the councillors and partners more visible and accountable.

Methodology

Two events were held on the 22nd September 2011. Residents were invited to come along and 'speed date' representatives. Each resident was given 15 minutes to ask questions to Councillors, Officers, the Police and the Fire Service.

Questions were given in advance but residents were able to ask additional questions at the events. A facilitator was at each table to record what was being discussed.

In addition to the events, comment cards were available so residents could send their views on what they thought made a 'place' good to live, what they think needed to be improved to make Tamworth a better place to live and any other general comment.

19 residents attended the events and 152 comment cards were returned.

Key findings

- It is evident that people want to know what the Council is doing and want to be more informed. From various consultations it appears that council services need to be better promoted.

Reduce level of crime

- There is a perceived threat of anti-social behaviour in relation to large numbers of young people gathering. Residents felt that having more sport and leisure opportunities would help deal with this issue.
- Inconsiderate and/or illegal parking was seen as a problem in Tamworth, especially within town centre residential areas.
- We need to do more to tackle residents' fear of crime and anti-social behaviour.

Improve job prospects

- Respondents view available employment in Tamworth as low wage and low skill.
- Respondents feel that Tamworth Borough Council should do all it can to encourage a range of employment opportunities.

Respondents were asked to select from a list four things that they thought made somewhere a good place to live.

The four key areas selected that make somewhere a good place to live were:

1. Low levels of crime
2. Good job prospects
3. Affordable decent housing
4. Good education provision

Twice the amount of men than women indicated that good sports and leisure facilities made somewhere a good place to live. Good education provision tended to be more important to women than men.

What would make Tamworth a better place to live?

Respondents were then asked to select five things that they felt needed to improve most to make Tamworth a better place to live.

The five key areas selected that would make Tamworth a better place to live were:

1. Reduce level of crime
2. Improve job prospects
3. Improve cleanliness of streets
4. Improve affordable decent housing
5. Improve shopping facilities

More women than men selected that job prospects needed to improve to make Tamworth a better place to live. Improved sports and leisure facilities and improved parks and open spaces tended to be more important to men.

Reduce level of crime

When asked the question "have you ever been directly affected by crime or anti-social behaviour?" very few focus group attendees have been. Concerns are mainly due to large numbers of young people hanging around or the nature of the night time economy in Tamworth. Attendees were reluctant to come into the town centre at night because they were afraid of what would happen. This raises the question about what we are going to do tackle residents' fear of crime and anti-social behaviour.

There is a feeling that the Police and Tamworth Borough Council do not work together to tackle crime and anti-social behaviour.

"Making the town safer must be a priority. Many of us are afraid to go out in the evening and certainly wouldn't go into Tamworth town centre due to the anti social behaviour"

"The low-level crime needs to be tackled as a priority"

41 respondents out of the 132 who indicated that levels of crime and anti-social behaviour needed to improve disagreed that the Police and other local public services are successfully dealing with anti-social behaviour and crime in their local area.

More than 60% indicated that anti-social behaviour was not a big problem or not a problem at all and they felt fairly safe or very safe when out in their local area after dark.

Tackling crime and anti-social behaviour is an area where residents feel the council could do more preventative work. They believe that promoting the sports and leisure opportunities we provide or providing additional accessible sport and leisure opportunities for young people will help to tackle youth crime and anti-social behaviour.

"Give teens more leisure facilities, youth clubs etc, they get in trouble less"

"Put funds into prevention"

"We need to stop relying on enforcement, it doesn't work. You need to teach people"

Respondents were asked to consider a number of different crimes and anti-social behaviour, and identify if any were a problem for them in their local area.

Noisy neighbours or loud parties were seen as the smallest problem with 16% of respondents indicating that this was a very big problem or a fairly big problem in their area.

Respondents were more likely to have no opinion on people using or dealing drugs in their local area which may be because this is a less obvious crime.

People being drunk or rowdy in public places is rated as the biggest problem, followed by people using or dealing drugs and vandalism, graffiti or other deliberate damage to property or vehicles.

Respondents comment that vandalism and graffiti also contribute to people's perceptions of an area being dangerous and them feeling unsafe. There are also concerns that if an area looks uncared for it is more likely to be vandalised.

"dirt breeds dirt. If graffiti isn't cleaned up it's almost like saying 'it's ok to graffiti here'. It's the same with litter. If a place is already littered people are more likely to drop their rubbish"

It is the perception of some respondents that Street Wardens only patrol in the town centre and they would like to see increased patrols in other parts of the Borough. They also feel that more wardens are needed in the evening when anti-social behaviour is most prevalent.

Improve job prospects

84% of respondents felt that improved job prospects would make Tamworth a better place to live. *Work with businesses to create more employment locally* was ranked as highest priority under *aspire and prosper in Tamworth*.

Respondents feel that Tamworth typically offers low wage employment and as a result of this graduates have to move away to find suitable employment. They also feel opportunities to develop a skilled trade have vanished, putting school leavers at a disadvantage when looking for work.

Although respondents recognise that employment is an issue nationally, they feel Tamworth Borough Council should do all it can to encourage businesses to locate in Tamworth and therefore develop a range of employment opportunities for its residents.

"it would be good to see more employment for school leavers who have lower academic qualifications, more apprenticeships would be good"

"Job prospects in Tamworth are very limited"

Respondents also think there needs to be opportunities for out of work adults to retrain in a different employment area.

Improve cleanliness of streets

Litter, dog fouling and general street cleanliness is an issue that is raised time and time again. Many express the view that street cleaning is an area where the council do not perform well and think that Tamworth is extremely unclean, especially when compared to other nearby towns.

"The streets are untidy, both through litter and unkempt grassed areas, even after cutting by sub contractors"

"I understand that everything is a balancing act but more could be done on litter-picking as parts of the town are starting to look untidy.

Near to me the area between the canal and Durlston

Close/Brancaster Close has a lot of litter particularly by the canal bridge. If the litter can't be picked can you at least provide more bins for people to put the litter into?"

"Disgraceful litter – why plant flowers when the streets aren't clean"

"Litter is a major issue"

"Litter seems to be getting worse (or I'm just noticing it more!)

Problem I guess is some people not bothered about making a mess, having no pride in the town, feeling no ownership of their town/locality, unconscious bad habits"

Although respondents accept that residents themselves have a responsibility to not drop litter, there is a belief that the Council should do more to improve the appearance of the local environment. There are areas in the borough where street sweeping is difficult due to parked cars and residents in these areas think something needs to be done to address this issue.

When it comes to the service as a whole, respondents tend to express the view that the service is not joined up and do not understand, for example, why, if someone is emptying the litter bins the area is not litter picked at the same time by the same person. This tends to give respondents a poor view of the service irrelevant of whether the service is actually performing well in that area.

An issue with the levels of litter was a concern that came out of the 2010 Tamworth Listens along with dissatisfaction with the maintenance of the environment in certain areas of the borough.

Respondents were asked to what extent they agreed or disagreed that their local area, Tamworth town centre and Tamworth borough were kept clean and free from litter. **Page 17**

42% of respondents disagreed that their local area was kept clean and free from litter. This was slightly less for the town centre with 40.6% expressing the view that it unclean and littered. Nearly half of respondents disagreed that the borough of Tamworth was kept clean and free from litter.

One of the concerns about the town centre is the chewing gum on the ground and respondents feel this makes the town centre look dirty even if there's no litter about. It was also suggested that some of the shop windows contribute to the town centre looking 'scruffy' and more should be done to make shops keep the interior and exterior of the building neat and tidy and empty shop windows should be dressed so they do not look run down.

"More effort needed to ensure business premises responsibility to ensure they keep their buildings and environments clean"

Respondents feel that the council could do more to change people's behaviour of dropping litter. It was suggested that the town centre should have recycling bins as well as rubbish bins to encourage residents to recycle their waste.

Respondents also feel that more organised community litter pick days will help to make residents take more responsibility for their local environment and change attitudes to dropping litter.

There is also a problem with the reporting of fly-tipping, litter and general environmental maintenance. When asked if they have reported, for example, an incident of fly-tipping many

respondents will answer; no. There is an assumption that either someone else has reported it or someone from the council will see it and collect it. They then continue to notice the unreported fly-tipping and their perception is that the council is performing poorly. More needs to be done with residents to encourage them to report issues they have.

However, there were a few complaints about issues being reported but not then being actioned.

Improve affordable decent housing

More than half of respondents expressed the view that affordable decent housing needed to improve to make Tamworth a better place to live.

People feel that a range of affordable housing needs to be provided which meets people's needs.

"Check out empty houses and possibly build more bungalow housing so that larger flats and houses could be used for deserving larger families who have lived in Tamworth for years"

"A whole generation is locked out of the housing market and with growing unemployment the young generation need more council housing"

"More rented housing for young, single people in the centre of town. Families get priority for council housing and young single people don't have a chance"

"More properties for the young Tamworthians so they have somewhere to live so that they could be proud of their own homes instead of living with parent"

Respondents want to see more quality in affordable housing and feel the council should do more to ensure that residents are living in decent homes that provide adequate space.

"Site at Amington Fields been earmarked for affordable housing for 15 years but nothing has been done. Need to get more affordable housing in Tamworth"

"Lots of empty flats and houses in Tamworth which should be used for affordable housing"

"Less housing projects creating rabbit hutches for people to live in, better quality houses"

Improve shopping facilities

Respondents express the view that on the whole shopping in Tamworth is good. However, dissatisfaction is expressed at the quality of shops, bars and restaurants in the town centre and many feel that the council is actively encouraging businesses to site on Ventura Park, leaving the town centre to decline.

"Tamworth town centre is in danger of 'closing' the range of shops is poor; the condition of shops is poor. We seem obsessed with Ventura Park"

The view that the council is 'killing off' the town centre is not helped by the parking charges which many see as unreasonably high and state that this is the reason they will not come into the town centre.

"Quite often I would like to visit town centre and Ventura on the same day but refuse to pay exorbitant parking charges in town when I can park free in Ventura."

Respondents feel that drastic change needs to take place in the town centre and they express the view that Ventura Park has become the new town centre. There is much support for linking Ventura Park and the town centre whether this be by improving the walkways by creating a safer, clearer and more direct route or by providing direct public transport between the two areas.

"It should be simple to walk there and back; due to the lack of pedestrian crossings ...you take your life in your hands trying to cross the road. There are plenty of people who would walk if it wasn't so dangerous!"

"It would be great for the town centre to have more visitors from out of Tamworth shuttled over to our very lovely town centre but we do need better retail businesses by bringing down business rates And getting landlords on board to do more reasonable rents. So we could attract more different and diverse retailers. I.e. independent fashion boutiques, ASK restaurant chain, wine bar, galleries and art shops"

Many respondents presume that the council owns most of the shops in the town centre and therefore has more control over the businesses that set up in them.

Concerns were also raised about the traffic congestion at Ventura Park and this often means they will shop elsewhere.

Improve health services

43.7% of respondents felt that health services needed to be improved to make Tamworth a better place to live.

The main issue that is raised is Tamworth does not have a hospital and respondents feel that Burton and Sutton Coldfield are too far to travel for both patients and visitors.

"The Peel Hospital needs to provide A&E facilities. Good Hope is too far away"

"Health service is an issue because of distance needed to travel to nearest hospital"

"We have been in need of a 'proper' all facilities hospital. Good as Sir Robert Peel is, the population here need a fully operational hospital with most facilities"

Respondents also support a preventative approach to health services and feel the council should support more projects that promote healthy living.

"More programmes aimed at helping people to lose weight. Need to do something to tackle obesity. Fast food chains, McDonalds etc should be made to do something to counteract obesity"

Improve education provision

Almost half of respondents (47.7) felt that good education provision made somewhere a good place to live. 36.4% felt that education provision needed to improve to make Tamworth a better place to live.

The perception of respondents is that Tamworth offers low education standards and they feel that this may put off families that wish to move here. There is also a concern that this will make families move out of Tamworth to areas where the education standard is perceived to be higher.

"We, as a family are concerned over school league tables and whether to move to Lichfield before our children get to secondary school"

Improve parks and open spaces

Many respondents use the parks and open spaces in Tamworth and overall 76.8% were satisfied with the facilities available to them.

Respondents express the view that the castle grounds is very good but that outside of this area, standards are more variable and it is these areas that require greater focus.

Community events

Community events were ranked as the lowest area that makes somewhere a good place to live. However, respondents see the benefits of bringing visitors into Tamworth and creating a sense of community pride.

Respondents feel that the standard and quality of outdoor events run by Tamworth Borough Council are excellent.

Generally, those who do not feel there is enough variety in events want more events for families, children and older people, a better variety of music events and a food festival. Respondents would also like to see the castle grounds used more for events.

Sports and leisure

17.9% of respondents indicated that improved sports and leisure opportunities would make Tamworth a better place to live.

Many who attended the budget consultation focus groups were unsure what sports and leisure opportunities the council offered to residents and did not tend to use them. They expressed the view that the council needed to promote the sport and leisure opportunities better.

There was praise for the work that has been done at the Castle with the Staffordshire Hoard and many would like to see a permanent exhibition.

Many have expressed the view that Tamworth's leisure offer could be improved by utilising the rivers, providing boat trips.

Blog comments

“Generally the council do a very good job and I am really happy to live in Tamworth. I understand that everything is a balancing act but more could be done on litter-picking as parts of the town are starting to look untidy. Near to me the area between the canal and Durlston Close/Brancaster Close has a lot of litter particularly by the canal bridge. If the litter can't be picked can you at least provide more bins for people to put the litter into?”

“Benches at the skate park. The skate park could really do with some benches as when it is busy it would make a big difference to its users. As a regular skate park I often get annoyed at people resting or just chilling out on the ramps. They are often in the way and putting them self at risk when other users are using the ramps they are sitting on. A few benches here and there would hopefully stop people sitting on the ramps and would make the skate park safer and better to use for every one that uses it. Thanks for reading.”

“I think TBC does an excellent job generally, I chose Tamworth as a place to live 8 years ago and have never regretted moving here, there is so much to do and the council has done their best to keep services going. I do think that some bus services have been reduced by too much, and if you need a connection with the 110, there is often a long wait, as this service no longer goes down Lichfield road, I have a 25 minute wait for the number 3 at 6.20pm, which after a hospital visit, is the last thing I need.

“Contrary to the views of the other 2 posters I have lived in Tamworth for 31 years and have seen it slowly going to hell in a hand-basket.

- The streets are untidy both through litter and unkempt grassed areas, even after cutting by sub contractors;
- My local park is regularly used as a car park with accompanying damage to the grass by a private rugby club, despite specific bye-laws to the contrary;
- The town centre dying slowly while Tamworth Borough Council encourages big companies onto Ventura Park;
- Car parking charges that encourage drivers to park in local suburban areas causing traffic chaos or to go to Ventura Park where parking is free;
- The sell-off of Peaks to private industry instead of maintaining and investing in the future of people and the town;
- An attempt by the council to hand over ownership of the housing stock to private housing associations;

These are just a few of the things that have made Tamworth a less appealing place to live- and perhaps more importantly to visit”

"The biggy for me is antisocial behaviour but littering fly tipping, poop scooping and graffiti come under that banner as well. Education from nursery school upwards is vital to try to minimise these unwanted behaviours but we need to do it in a fun engaging way when they are young but clamp down hard on older age groups. There are nowhere near enough litter bins in the town and certainly not enough dog waste bins. People don't like carrying it around trying to find a bin so either dump the bag in the nearest bush or don't pick it up at all. One of my biggest pet hates that really annoys me is people who eat in car parks such as Asda and EVEN McDonalds itself and plonk their rubbish on the floor by the car sometimes even when there's a bin right by them. If there's CCTV on these car parks they should be prosecuted to teach them a lesson. Its pure idleness they just expect someone from the shop to come and clear up behind them"

"I think they should help more with insulating homes that cannot get cavity wall such as myself, I have done all I can but still need more. I work 16 hrs a week so only get a small wage, but due to working I cant get any grants etc, I live in a pre fabricated house, which I know was only to temporarily house people during the war an should have been knocked down by now? I'm paying an astonishingly high rent and council tax and should be helped more? I have approached our mp about this thinking that something else could be done but to no avail? My gas bill alone this year thru the winter was about 450 pounds which I struggled paying off? This day and age is hard enough money wise for lots of people, so this should be just one simple thing that should be looked at to help save money all round? There are lots of ways to insulate a house but it costs money, money I don't have, and considering I'm paying to live in a council property then my stupidly high council tax bill should surely cover this too? Please let me know if anyone agrees?"

"The council have a tough job to sort out a lot of the issues, since selling off prize assets like the Peaks and the Municipal Golf Course there's little in the way of control of these things. It wasn't so long ago that Tamworth had a highly capable council, sad to see the state it's in now. The Ankerside is looking very tired and it could do with some exterior TLC. I'm sure this isn't a direct council responsibility but presumably the owners have a responsibility to the upkeep of the facade. The council should really spend some time, money and effort in trying to regenerate the town centre. Ventura park, which is an utterly miserable place to spend any time at all, has free car parking so it's highly likely that people will visit it, from both in and out of town, and go home again without going near the town centre. If the town centre is to survive it must attract some of these folk and make it a desirable place to visit. Please don't spend our money on town planning consultants, you'd be better off hiring a decent PR agency and selling the virtues of the town to visitors and businesses. (By the way, whoever you've got right now doesn't fit the description)

The visitors centre in the Phil Dix building is actually really good. You'd never know it was there. That's just a shocking waste of our money. Use decent marketeers."

"I agree entirely with Chris's email, and in part with a lot of the others. I have lived in Tamworth since March 1972, originally coming in on the overspill. We have seen a pretty market town turn into a grim desert. Correct marketing is essential, and it is not being proficiently done at the moment. The town centre is a dismal place to visit, with little in the way of decent shops. It's very 'bitty' all told. We need shops where we can purchase ordinary day to day things and also clothes, not just charity shops (which serve a good purpose but we have too many) and mobile phone shops. Tamworth should try to attract quality, and at the moment it does not. Ventura park is Ok for those who like to shop (I don't), but there is insufficient parking – on a Saturday if you are not there by 9.30, forget it! Also insufficient exits make shopping there unbearable at busy times. Just try and get out of the Homebase car park at busy times – an hour of one's day wasted. Obviously, I try to shop when it is not busy, but one has to consider those who work. Fingers out, Tamworth, and get cracking. Clear rubbish from walkways (the walkway through Lothersdale parallel to Pennine Way is a shocking sight), get marketing and make our little town a pleasure to come to"

"Q: Why doesn't the council tell us how to save their/our money, and push us much more into doing it, especially how to avoid unnecessary council work and expense (e.g. litter picking)?

Is the answer:

- a) It does – even though I'm not aware of it?
- b) It doesn't want to because that might mean doing some Council Workers out of a job (an understandable fear)?
- c) It just hasn't given this enough attention?"

Butter Market comments

Tamworth residents and businesses were invited to put questions to the Leader and Deputy Leader of Tamworth Borough Council and the Cabinet member for Quality of Life during an event held in the Butter Market.

Visitors to the event also got the chance to make their voices heard by writing their suggestions on a graffiti wall. Suggestions to improve the borough included holding a film evening in the Castle Grounds and for Tamworth Borough Council to offer more help to businesses wanting to expand.

- Open the town hall more often for people to see.
- Too many food outlets
- More ashtrays to avoid fines
- Free carry round 'doubters' for fags.
- More litter bins on streets.
- Regular, on time bus services that's cheaper. People can't get to work or job interviews on time!
- Recycle bins throughout the town centre
- You don't make enough of our assets!
- Allow fly posting if it is controlled.
- Don't be so protective on allowing things to happen. And don't run everything. Example, the poster boards are paid for by the council tax payer and should not be used exclusively for Tamworth Borough Council.
- Bring Tamworth Information Centre back to town – no one knows where it is – older people won't walk that far.
- Tamworth town centre support group/think tank. Tamworth town centre traders start to think about how they can work with the council/county council and other bodies to see what ideas we can come up with to improve the town centre.

- A free transport link between Ventura Park and the town centre

- We have been in need of a 'proper' all facilities hospital. Good as Sir Robert Peel is, the population here need a fully operational hospital with most facilities.
- Keep paths and areas away from roads cleaner
- Traffic on Ventura is as bad as ever. More entry/exit places urgently needed
- Side street gutters (town centre) choked up. Never swept. Pavement in Victoria Rd needs relaying - a court case in waiting

- Litter is a major issue
- More job opportunities
- Proper hospital - crown magistrates and county courts - improve parks and river areas totally underutilised. Town centre - demolish middle entry and create proper square with shops, bars and restaurants. Improve roads and signage. If Tamworth has no access to extra land build properties higher. University.
- Education, education, education
- Make vandals accountable for their actions. Offenders who are identified should clean up their handiwork.
- Cleanliness and tidiness not just in the town centre. On all estates.
- We could do with some good shops in the town centre. If we do not get better shops the town will become a ghost town
- Reducing costs should come out of bankers pay, not everyone elses!!
- I do not agree with increasing any of the above. Reports have shown that Tamworth is the fattest town so increasing leisure facilities would not be a great idea. Traders should feel encouraged to have shops within Ankerside and also High Street stores.
- Prioritise health and employment

- As TBC will be taking over full responsibility of the rents they will need to be very careful where they cut as the general public are being crushed from all sides. Destroying the good will of their tenants.

- I am sure we could reduce the number of Councillors per ward and the Borough Councillors should take the places of the County Councillors. By reducing the number of Councillors it should follow that the number of Council Officers supporting the Councillors could be reduced.
- Reduce the number of councillors per ward
- reducing utility bills and increasing recycling in offices and council owned buildings
- All councillors should declare their attendance levels and only be paid the minimum wage band declare their expenses publically.
- don't give people money to leave council houses clean, they should anyway out of respect, instead charge them for the clean up

- Stop wasting money on big canopy that hasn't been used for anything, would have been better invested in getting new businesses into the town to justify the rent and rate charged for this location
- Start putting money into the town not Ventura before there isn't a town
- LADYBRIDGE ;-maybe widen the pavements a little and put flower tubs on there too.
- CONSIDER/PERHAPS put a noticeboard up depicting the HISTORY of the bridge;- making it more of an attraction LEADING to the Castle itself.
- Perhaps make a pictorial signage of the bird life and other wildlife that also use the bridge, there are many species. Frogs, toads, grass snakes, blue tits, and coal tits, thrush, blackbird, wren, hedge sparrow, yellow hammer, even a woodpecker, also in the actual meadow behind the bridge we recently photographed a lapwing. There are also Gulls, and terns, herons, and a kingfisher; - in the banking. It's a small but effective and thriving 'man made' nature reserve.

- Try to make people put the unsightly bins inside their own gardens. Since new people have moved into this area, (within the last year), bins have begun to be left outside homes, and are a mess to see, especially in warmer weather. Flies and smells don't help give a good impression.
- To assist in the recycling projects, allow a free use to a 'car boot' (officially organised) sale on the car park beside the Air cadets' centre/st Johns centre, on a Sunday maybe? (Moor St./Richmond close).
- People will sell or swap items and save on items being binned? This has been a great success where my sister lives. Rubbish has reduced in landfill by 16% or more.
- Give scrap metal dealers an OFFICIAL day for each area;- then people can put out unwanted electrical and metal goods on a set day, and the "scrap dealers" won't be so annoying to people. Items will be collected and better use made of them? (less fly tipping?)
- In 'info biz' allow a small section for people who have moved house, to offer items for 'swaps';- items which don't fit in the new home they have gone to, but are too good/expensive to bin. (Curtains and blinds etc).
- It will encourage people to read it more, and bin it less? If it's read more, advertisers will use it more?
- Stop cars parking on the dropped kerbs and the grass verges, outside disabled person's homes. It damages the grass and it spoils the area. (It's also inconsiderate, dangerous, and inconvenient to have to walk right round in the SIDE OF THE ROAD, approx one lamp post distance, just to get back to the other side of the 'bad drivers' car)
- Maybe put a white line in front of the dropped kerb.
- (and a no dog fouling sign?) The one over the road is too high up and is ignored.

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
