We have improved the flow and accessibility of the document to make it easier to read. The fairness was already there, the transparency has been improved. The policy change table attached as <u>Annex 2</u> identifies each change made following a gap analysis of the existing policy by the consultant commissioned Campbell Tickell Ltd.

The key areas of change are:

- 1. Compliance with legislation introduced after 2021
- 2. New section: force majeure
- 3. New section: statement of choice
- 4. Statutory duty for former members of the armed forces now included
- 5. Disqualification criteria: financial threshold increased to £70,000
- 6. Negotiated tenancy surrender: strengthened to cover tenants who ask for help where their tenancy is failing in accordance with guidance and regulation.
- 7. Age restricted properties; medical need will be given greater preference than just age criteria.
- 8. Effective band date; clearer guidance given
- 9. Care leavers still in support up to 25 will be given low social/welfare
- 10. Out-of-borough homeless household placements who would benefit returning to the borough will be given low social/welfare.
- 11. Statement on pitches for gypsies and travellers as there none in the borough

Who will be affected and how?

- All existing applicants and new applicants will be favourably impacted by the accessibility of the document.
- Lower income households will benefit from the increased financial threshold.
- Tenants who need to be rehoused because all other avenues to sustain the tenancy have been exhausted will benefit.
- Care leavers will benefit up to the age of 25.
- Out-of-borough homeless placements may benefit.
